Over the past year, Réseau réussite Montréal (RRM) has continued its strategic analysis to better define the principles that guide its action. This process, stemming from a collaborative effort among the board of trustees, has resulted in the development of a **clearer mission statement** and **meaningful values**, which will support our collective engagement.

Mission

Mobilize all partners on the Island of Montreal to put conditions in place that promote educational success and enable all young people to reach their full potential.

Definition of educational success

In general, educational success is the development of knowledge and skills that allow people from early childhood to adulthood to fulfill their potential. Broader than academic achievement, it incorporates intellectual, cognitive, emotional, social, and physical dimensions and takes into account diverse educational pathways, both linear and alternative. Educational success is thus a shared responsibility that hinges on support from all of society.¹

Priorities for action

- Foster school-community collaboration around capacitybuilding projects aligned with the targets set out in success plans of school service centres and school boards.
- Forge connections among all partners and the community, as well as the cohesion of actions promoting school perseverance and educational success.
- Document, promote, and disseminate information relevant to actions that encourage school perseverance and educational success.
- Support stakeholders' ability to act and create partner mobilization opportunities.



Continued participation in the government's catch-up plan

The summer of 2024 at RRM featured improved camp offerings and the implementation of numerous projects aimed at mitigating learning loss over the summer, as part of the Ministère de l'Éducation's catch-up plan.

Going further... together

Bringing together diverse expertise and engaging in collaborative efforts took on a whole new dimension for RRM in 2024–2025, in particular through the implementation of major projects coordinated with multiple partners.

A few examples:

Joint leadership of mobilization efforts around Montreal data from the 3rd edition of the Québec Health Survey of High School Students (QHSHSS), in conjunction with **Montreal's public health department** (details on pages 14 and 24).

Updating and making institutional dashboards interactive to track the high school-CÉGEP transition among nearly 65,000 graduates. This is a Trajectoires project, an initiative of Regroupement des cégeps de Montréal and Réseau réussite Montréal, with funding from the Quebec government and in partnership with ÉCOBES — Recherche et transfert and Pôle interordres de Montréal (details on page 13).

Improved communications for better outreach

Over the past year, our communications team has stepped up efforts to promote RRM's work and support the organization in producing tools and carrying out campaigns. As a result, we have a greater presence on our platforms, more strategic content, and more consistent communications in support of RRM's mission and community.

Resources that respond to partner needs and situations

Providing tools for our partners is at the heart of RRM's actions, and the past year was especially rich in practical initiatives to support decision-making, promote autonomy, and strengthen the long-term viability of stakeholder activities in Montreal. True to our value of adaptability, RRM sought to address significant changes in the field of educational success by engaging where needs were most acute (details on pages 15, 23, and 24).



Youth with recent immigrant backgrounds

Half of all Quebec students with immigrant backgrounds live in Montreal.¹ Aware of the challenges faced by some of these youths, especially those with recent immigrant backgrounds, RRM strives to promote a shared understanding of their experiences, of the obstacles to their educational success, and of the issues affecting the local community. RRM also works to strengthen capacity among regional actors to support the inclusion of these students, with a particular focus on the most vulnerable students.

Boosting literary skills to improve chances of success

Reading and writing skills play a fundamental role in educational success. Which is why RRM works so hard to promote the development of literacy right from early childhood and throughout young peoples' schooling.



Helping anglophone students feel more comfortable in French as a second language

The insecurity that many young anglophones feel when speaking French can be a hindrance to them continuing their studies in Quebec, to finding jobs, and to fully participating in Quebec society. In response, RRM and its partners are collaborating on efforts to build the confidence of these students to communicate in French and to persevere in the face of of linguistic challenges, both real and perceived.

Creation of a pilot project with 3 sub-initiatives in English-speaking schools:

- Classroom testimonials from young anglophones who have overcome their linguistic insecurity and are thriving in francophone environments (Y4Y Québec)
- > Workplace internships with anglophone employees working in French (Chamber of Commerce of Metropolitan Montreal)
- → Assistance for young anglophones writing their CVs and preparing for job interviews (Carrefours jeunesse-emploi)

Slowing the summer slide

During extended school breaks (e.g., summer vacation), students in vulnerable situations suffer a more marked regression in their learning, especially reading skills, than other students.



Language socialization in day camps project

Isolation over the summer can hinder the social and language integration process for children of recent immigrants. This is why RRM works to offer them an inclusive environment that encourages language socialization and helps them maintain their French skills over the summer with a project adapted to the specific needs of this population and the barriers they face.

- → 95% of facilitators felt somewhat or entirely qualified to facilitate in intercultural contexts.
- → 90% of facilitators used techniques that enabled children to better integrate into activities.
- -> 69% of facilitators observed a notable improvement in group cohesion over the course of the summer.
- Surveyed facilitators highlighted a notable improvement in campers' ability to express themselves in French, in their participation in activities, and in their social interactions.

School transitions

Smooth school transitions: a key to well-being and success

If each smooth school transition improves a student's ability to face the next one, by the same token, a difficult transition can have negative repercussions on their educational success. This is why RRM is working to promote positive school transitions from early childhood settings to kindergarten, from elementary to high school, and from high school to post-secondary studies.

First school transition (T1)

A smooth entry into kindergarten builds the foundation for future transitions and also has a tangible effect on students' motivation and engagement at school, two key factors to educational success.

Elementary-high school transition (T2)

The challenges and changes experienced during the transition to high school make this a crucial step from the standpoint of educational success – one that can even trigger the process that leads to some students dropping out.

High school-CÉGEP transition (T3)

A high school diploma is not sufficient for most jobs, since many employers require vocational or post-secondary studies. Yet only 37.3% of Quebec students in regular public high school programs go on to CÉGEP after high school. It is thus important to learn more about the students who do not pursue post-secondary studies or who experience a difficult transition to this level.

Working students

Promoting work/school balance to help students find the sweet spot between the benefits and risks of working while going to school

Having a job while going to school can have many benefits. However, unless certain conditions are met, mixing school and work can have significant negative effects on students' educational success and health. Moreover, the appeal of having a job can sometimes weigh in the balance for students at risk of dropping out. This is why RRM engages in many activities to promote a shared understanding of the phenomenon and mobilize action.


