The mission of MHS is to mobilize partners in Montreal and become a focal point for initiatives that promote school perseverance. Its main strategy is to support the development of local joint-action plans for targeted areas on the Island of Montreal. MHS is documenting the determinants of school perseverance in these areas to help mobilize stakeholders, develop a common understanding of the issues, and shed light on local priorities.

In 2011, boys drop out at a slightly higher rate (7.7%) than girls (5.6%).

15.7% of English **Montreal School Board** students drop out in 2011: the rate is 20.8% on the Island of Montreal.

In 2011, 6.6% of students at Lester B. Pearson **High School leave school** without a diploma or qualification.

English Montreal School Board: 84% high school graduation rate in 2011; the targets are 86% for 2014 and 88% for 2020.

There are many services for families with children under 18 offered mostly in french, and organized service structures exist: Montréal-Nord en santé, Regroupement des écoles et milieux de santé (RÉMES), and an emergent literacy committee (comité d'éveil à la lecture et à l'écriture-ÉLÉ).
