Taking action on school perseverance in Montreal

Réseau réussite Montréal (RRM) promotes cooperation among stakeholders from all sectors in implementing projects that align with governmental policy objectives for educational success and focus on the needs of youth and their families in order to help keep young people in school.

EMERGING NEEDS IN MONTREAL

Putting the spotlight on emerging needs or growing problems in Montreal and supporting new projects in response.





SUPPORT FOR LOCAL ACTION

¹ This surplus stems from our requirement to declare as income an amount equivalent to \$10,000 of the loan taken out under the federal government's Canada Emergency Business Account. Without this income, RRM would have ended the year with a planned deficit of \$8,804 for supporting local actions.
